## IN THE NEWS THIS WEEK

While school is closed, every week in the newsletter, we will be including something from the news that the children might like to find out more about and talk about at home.

This week's question is: **What makes some toys more popular than others?**



The toy world is in the grip of a llama obsession as the woolly South American animals become the new industry sensation! At the American International Toy Fair in New York in February, there were llamas everywhere! Knitted, plush and sequined, small and large; llamas on mobile phone cases and swimming pool floats, llama diaries, puzzles and even backpacks.

Design and make a toy! Decide what you could make, using items you already have at home e.g. pencil puppets, a shoebox house, a sock soft toy. Be creative! Once you have decided, plan your design carefully: name of your toy, draw a labelled picture of your design, make a list of resources and equipment you will need, think about how you will make it.

Choose five toys and ask people in your home and/or some of your friends or family to select their favourite. The more people you can ask, the better! Once you have your data, can you display it in a bar chart?



Interview an adult member of your family to find out if the toys they play with have changed over time and why. Jot down some of the questions you might ask before you begin your interview.

Create your very own toy shop! You could use toys you have in your home. Decide how much each will cost and put price tags on them and create a price list. See if someone in your home will come and play in your toy shop!

Research toys from the past and compare with toys we have now. Discuss differences and similarities.

Describe your favourite toy. Think about what it looks and feels like, when and where you got it, how it works or how you use it to play and why it is your favourite toy. Make sure you include a picture of it too!



## LOVE READING!

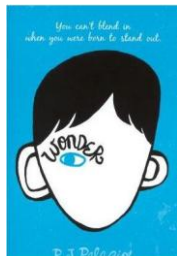

Then, once you've completed the online joining form, you'll have access to the BorrowBox library.

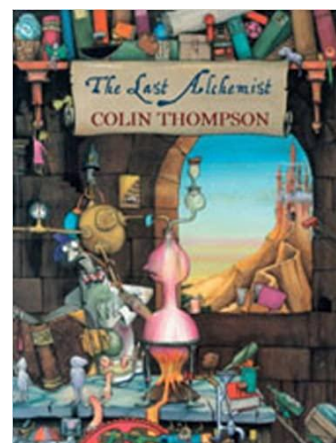
Here are this week's reading recommendations . . . from the children:



"I am reading 'Wonder' by JC Palacio at the moment. I really like it because it encourages people who might not feel confident to do things like starting a new school. It shows us that anyone can do anything as long as they believe in themselves. It also shows how important it is to be kind and not judge people on their looks."

. . . and from the staff:

"I really love 'The last alchemist' by Colin Thompson. The book is all about a king who is desperate to make gold. Every alchemist he turns to fails, until one day his latest recruit Spinifex promises the king riches beyond his wildest dreams. As time ticks on Spinifex becomes obsessed, he even tears rings from people's fingers. Then, as the Millennium approaches, Spinifex constructs his last great experiment - a huge machine stretching up from the cellar through the castle to the roof. However, the great gold-making machine only succeeds in destroying its creator, leaving just one tiny nugget of gold. Then, gold of another kind rains over the castle - sunlight rains down on the kingdom and banishes darkness and gloom forever. I bought this book from the book fair with my pocket money when I was at primary school myself and I've read it to every class I've taught. The illustrations are amazing and tell a story even without the words."

## REMINDER ABOUT 12<sup>th</sup> MAY DIARY PROJECT

2020 is the 10<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the 12<sup>th</sup> May Diary Project and the Mass Observation Archive are repeating its annual call for one-day diaries, capturing the everyday lives of people across the UK. The written diaries will be stored in the Archive at The Keep and be used by a wide range of people for research, teaching and learning.



In 1937 Mass Observation called for people from all parts of the UK to record everything they did from when they woke up in the morning to when they went to sleep at night on 12<sup>th</sup> May. This was the day of George VI's Coronation. The resulting diaries provide a wonderful glimpse into the everyday lives of people across Britain and have become an invaluable resource for those researching countless aspects of the era.

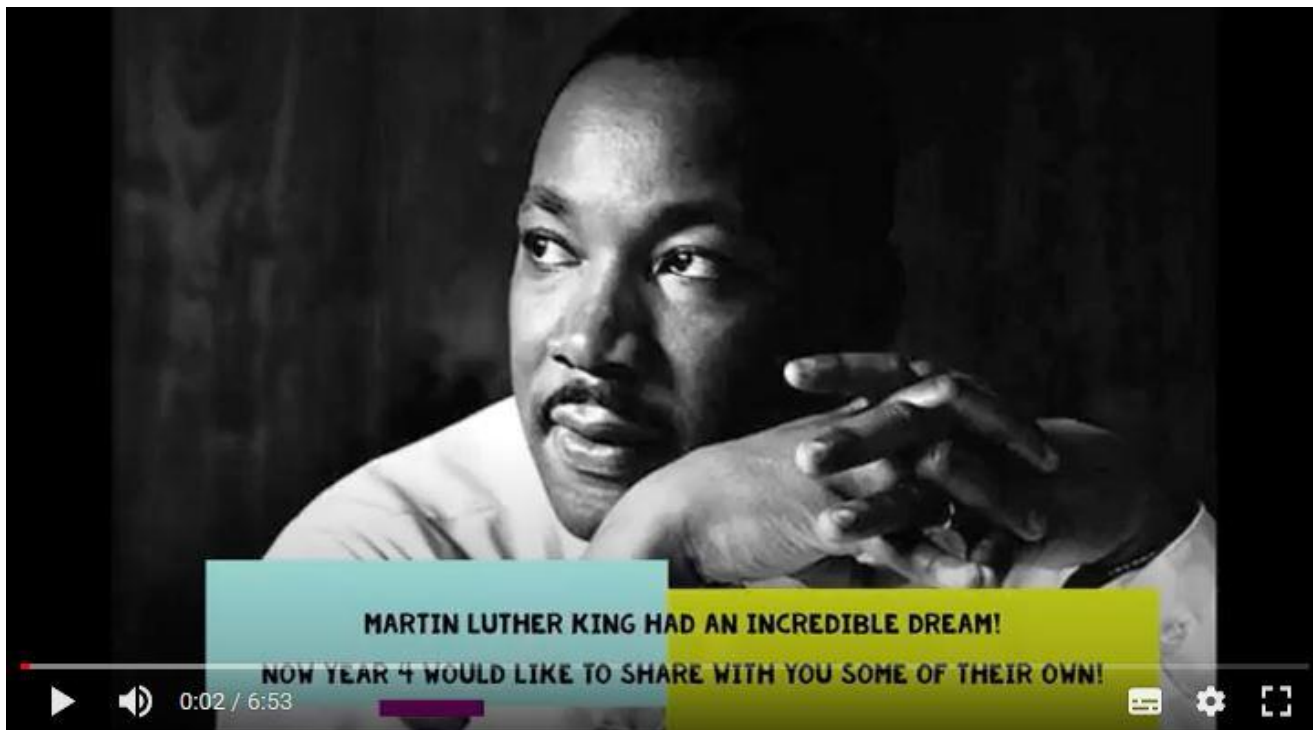
